Ernest Mercier

Some 70 Merciers including escorts attended the gathering around Honoré Mercier's monument in Québec City, on sunday, October the 16th, 1988. The vice-president Paul H. Mercier welcomed and thanked those attending. President Ernest Mercier summarized biefly the reasons why AMAN had decided to pay tribute to this distinguished past premier of Québec (1888-1891).

"Honoré Mercier", he said, "worked, within the provincial jurisdiction of the Canadian constitution, for the development of the three societies which have immensely contributed for ages to the fascinating history of humanity: the Family, the State and the Church. Honoré Mercier organized the first Conference of the provincial premiers of Canada held in Québec City in 1988. He

Canada held in Québec City in 1988. He strongly emphasized the proper use of provincial powers for the development of renewable resources in this country. He wisely solved, directly with Rome, the problem of reimbursing the Jesuits whose belongings had been confiscated by the Canadian Government in 1801, following the British decision taken in 1791 to


disband the Jesuit Society".

André Mercier then described the stately monument erected in hommage to Honoré Mercier on June the 25th 1912, nearby Grande-Allée, in front of "L'Assemblée nationale du Québec". André was assisted by Isabelle Mercier-Dufour who read the inscriptions witten in bronze on the four sides of the monument base. Three of these four inscriptions are

quotations taken from the Premier's

speeches.

The shortest one is on the front (East) "Let us stop our brotherly side: disputes and unite". The one on the South side deals with the necessity of available to making **Education** classes of the Ouébec society, including city and farming workers. The last, on the North side is a pledge for justice that rulers of any country must be guided by at all times. In brief, Premier Mercier strongly believed in provincial autonomy, and the necessity for Québec to act constantly as leading agent in the various fields of renewable development: agriculture, resources

industry, communications, and human populations. He helped large families by granting a 100-acre woodlot to any one counting 12 children or more. He greatly endeavoured to civilize politics.

After the ceremony around the monument, most people went to the Hôtel Lowes le Concorde, first to have their Lunch, and then to look at photos and videocassettes taken during the Mercier trip in Europe. Around 4 P.M., the traveling agency Voyages Lambert inc. graciously served cake and coffee to participants before their returnning home.

Thanks to every participant; to Roger Mercier and his wife, Christiane, for the showing of their videocassette on the Mercier trip; to Voyage Lambert for its snack and the "Hôtel Lowes le Concorde" for the free use of a meeting room.

WHAT ARE YOUR ROOTS?

Most of the Merciers living in North America -- at least 25 000 people -- originate from six french bachelors who took land and wife and left descendants in New France between 1630 and 1765. One of them bad the lion's share in the fairly Large north american Mercier family.

. Jullien Mercier from Tourouve, Perche, married Marie Poulain in Sainte-Anne-de-Beaupré. The couple had 10 children, six boys and four girls. Eight of the children (five boys and three girls) had offspring who are found in all provinces of Canada and most areas of the United States.

. Pierre Mercier knowm as Caudebec from Barneville-Carteret Normandy, married André Martin in Beaubassin, Acadia (Amherst, N.S.). Being banished from Acadia, the couple settled in Saint-Pierre-du-Sud (Montmagny County). Descendants from Alexandre, their son, are limited in number.

. The miller Pierre Mercier, from Saint-Denis-de-la-Chevasse, Poitou (vendée), married Marguerite Lemain from Neuville, a locality west of Québec city. Out of the eight children, only two boys survived. Their descendants are found mostly in Eastern Ontario and, to a lesser extent, in somme areas of Ouébec.

. Pierre-Simon Mercier from Ile-de-France (Paris) married Marie Renée Pineau in Verchères, on the south shore of the Saint-Lawrence River, in front of Montréal. Descendants from Joseph, one of their two sons, are found in the vallies of the Richelieu and Yamaska rivers and likely in the United States.

. Charles Mercier known as Lajoie came from Beaumont-la-Ronce (north of Tours). He was married to Marianne Lahayse in L'Assomption (town named Legardeur today) east of Montréal. Seven children (five boys and two girls) had large families whose offspring are found nowadays in saint-Roch-de-l'Achigan, in Montréal, on the south shore of the Saint-Lawrence River and probably in the United States.

Jean Mercier, from Saint-Jean-de-Cubzac, close to Bordeaux, was probably married to a young lady of New-Orleans, Louisiana. Descendants of this couple are found mostly in the southern and western states of USA.

The percent figures on the right side of the page indicate the chances that you may be related to one of these six Mercier ancestors. 

Rockefeller et nos peintres

Sister Yvonne Mercier, from Sherbrooke, is a direct descendant at the 9th generation, through Pierre and Marie Chamberland, from Jullien Mercier and Marie Poulain. Having joined in 1932, at 16 years of age, the religious congragation of "Les filles de la charité du Sacre-coeur-de-Jésus", she was soon sent to Angers, France, in September 1934, in order to increase cooperation between French and Québec provinces of the said congregation.

During the Second World war (1939-1945) she was displaced, with other non belligerent Canadians, by the German Armed Forces, rulers of France, on December 8th 1940, from Angers to Besançon and lived during four months the abject conditions of concentration camps: sleeping on straw infested by bed bugs; lacking toilet facilities; eeating day after day potatoes, broth and black German bread; being forced to eat by hand without utensils.

Suffering from acute otitis (ear infection), Sr. Yvonne was sent to the infirmary and finally returned to Angers in June 1941 where she was welcomed as a war hero by her religious society.

Sr. Yvonne witnessed twice the horrors of the air-force bombardments. German Angers to displace raided planes weakened French armed forces in June She was in Angers when American allied armed forces took away the city from German troops in the fall of 1944. In February 1946, she came back by boat to her native land suffering again from the same sea sickness she violently experienced in September 1934. Yvonne presently helps young girls in the Sherbrooke area to go through their university years without suffering the inconveniencies of home separation.

AMAN directors had asked Sr. Yvonne to be one of their **guests of honour** at the Mercier Retrouvailles in Sainte-Anne-de-Beaupré, She could not attend.

Long life to this faithful Mercier Lady.


