Thank you again for your cooperation.



Motivated and inspired by the dynamic energy of Lucienne MercierCroteau, the Merciers of Alberta have held their first reunion in Bonnyville, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> of June, 1989. Over a period of three months, the committee responsible for the planning of this reunion has:

organized a telephone pool aimed at contacting every Mercier family listed in all telephone directories in the province of Alberta;

designated members of each family directly or indirectly descendent of the original pioneer couple of Joseph Mercier and Emilie Mailhot (first wife) or Hélène Bérubé (second wife) to draw up a genealogical family record as recommended by AMAN;

established at close to 800 the number of persons related in some way to the pioneer Joseph Mercier who left Sainte-Julie, in the County of Megantic (Quebec), in 1907, to settle in Bonnyville, Alberta;

established a special fund to cover the cost of organizing the gathering of the Merciers of Alberta;

planned for future reunions; founded the Mercier Club of Alberta.

Activities planned for the first day of the celebrations, June 3<sup>rd</sup>, included:

registration of visitors; vewing of art exhibits, albums, old photographs and genealogical records of families related to the previously mentionned pioneer couple; thanksgiving mass attended by some 300 persons; banquet, grouping members of the 2<sup>th</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup> generations of descendents of Joseph Mercier, among them Anne-Marie and Antonio Mercier, both well over 90 years of age;

a minute of silence, in memory of departed members of AMAN as well as desceased sons and daughters of the pionner couple;

presentation of gifts and souvenirs to Lucienne MercierCroteau and a few specially guests, including Roger Boulanger, the hospitable brother in law from Montréal. and the president of AMAN;

dance-social, enlivened by the participation of a number of talented young Merciers from Western Canada.

Second day activities, on Sunday June , took place on the site of the original homestead cleared by Joseph Mercier and his many sons and daughters: Armand, Antonio, Anatole and Anne-Marie, children of the first marriage, and Gérard, Trefflé, Rose-Anna and Adrienne, children of the second marriage. Five of ten children, viz., Antonio, Trefflé, Rose-Anna Anne-Marie, Adrienne are still living. homestead is now the property of Armand Fortier and Germaine Mercier and their six children (five girls and one boy).

This friendly gathering of the Mercier of Western Canada, at the Mercier ancestral home in Bonnyville, comprised:

a world of welcome to the Mercier
festivities;

an appetizing barbecue prepared by the gracious hosts with the help of the Mercier-Croteau and other Mercier families;

mini-tour by covered wagon, carrying members of the family, articles of furniture and small livestock as it did in days of yore;

testimony by the two nonagenarians, Anne-Marie and Antonio;

a tribute to the early settlers who built and developed this part of the country;


unveiling of a commemorative plaque honouring the original pioneers. The plaque was placed on a wooden stand erected on the site of an artesian well dug at the rear of the second home built on the original homestead; raising of the flags of Canada and the Province of Alberta on flag poles recently erected on the front lawn of the newly built spacious and modern home;

proclamation of victors in the family
athlethic events;

sing-song, stories, music, etc.;
evening meal and late night dancing.

The Merciers of Alberta are late arrivals to the fold but their coming has been a memorable one. The enthusiasm and spirit of comradship wich characterized the team of organizers and all participants were typical of the old time wedding parties and soirées. A real oldfashioned get together as you can only experience in Western Canada.

All the Merciers present, some of whom came from other Western provinces, viz., Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British



Columbia, are descendents of Julien Mercier and Marie Poulain, through Jean, the fifth son of the pioneer couple, who was married to Barbe Monmainier. The various migratory stages of the ancestors of Joseph are as follows: Sainte-Anne and Saint-Joachim de Beaupré (Quebec); Saint-François du Sud (Montmagny); St-Henri de Lauzon (Levis); Ste-Marie de Beauce; St-Pierre Baptiste, Laurierville and Ste-Julie (Megantic); and finally Bonnyville, Alberta.

When communicating with the Merciers of Alberta, it is often necessary to use both French and English language. Second generation Merciers can still speak good French. Some of their descendents of the third generation can understand some French but prefer to speak English. This can be easily understood. Engulfed as they are in a sea of English language and culture, they naturally tend to become assimilated as so many of our emigrants to the United States have done. Strange as it may seem, some of the younger people of the fourth and fifth generations can still themselves in French. They have had the opportunity of taking immersion courses in French along with a number of English speaking people sold on the idea of a bilingual Canada. More power to them.

Whatever language they may have chosen to use, all the Merciers present at the Bonnyville gathering reacted enthusiastically and seemed to enjoy themselves to the full.

Special tribute to the Mercier settlers on the South Shore

On the occasion of its annual meeting, on Sunday the 20th of August 1989, AMAN will unveil commemorative tablets in honnor of two Mercier settlers on the South Shore of the St-Lawrence River.

One of these tablets will be placed on land cleared in the year 1700 or thereabouts by the couple Pierre Mercier, also known as Caudebec, and Andrée Martin, with their son Alexandre, on the Rivière du Sud seignory, in the municipality of Saint-Pierre (Montmagny).


The other plaque will serve as a mark of identification on land originally owned by J. Pascal Mercier and his wife Madeleine Boucher and cultivated, since 1706, by their descendents in the village of Berthier-sur-Mer in the County of Montmagny.

Mark off that date, August 20th, on your calendar. Come and breathe the fresh air of the Lower St-Lawrence Valley. Enjoy a family

picnic while paying tribute to two of the early Mercier pioneers.

Roland J. Mercier, of La Pocatière, a direct descendent of Pierre Mercier and Andrée Martin, has accepted the responsibility of organizing the August 20th reunion, and he will be waiting to welcome all of you. Roland (Tel.: 856-1467) members of his welcoming committee will be your host at an old fashion corn-husking party. You must not disappoint them. It is to be hoped that the Merciers will gather there by the hundreds, if not thousands, on the morning of August 20th.

Pascal, Pierre and Jean Mercier, the three sons of Paschal Mercier and Anne Cloutier, to whom two-thirds of all the Merciers in North America can trace their ancestry, settled on the South Shore of the St-Lawrence prior to 1709. Let us pay special homage to our pioneer ancestors by making it our duty to be in Saint-François on August 20, 1989.



Claude Leon Mercier, forestry engineer and Land-surveyor, passed away in Montreal on January 28th 1989. A grand-son of the Honourable Honoré Mercier, former Premier of Quebec, Claude Leon Mercier was one of the original founding members of AMAN in 1985. He was a direct descendent of the pioneer couple Julien Mercier and Marie Poulain through the Jean Mercier and Barbe Monmainier branch of the Merciers.

AMAN extends to his wife, Mrs. Louise Lacroix, to his four children and three grand-children, its most sincere sympathy.



### THE GIFT TO MARIE ROLLET FOUNDATION

In November 1988, the artist, Monique Mercier of Nicolet (Quebec) donated a silk screen processed print on the occasion of the first fund raising drive in favor of the MARIE ROLLET foundation. Sale of copies of the donated print was initiated at City Hall in Quebec City. Proceeds of the sale will be applied to the maintenance and upkeep of the Marie-Rollet rest centre, formerly the Kinsmen's house. The Centre, established in 1961, is located in the parish of the Blessed Canadians Martyrs in Quebec City.

The Marie-Rollet rest room is a fifteen bed establishment and also provides three family rooms. It is a "heaven of peace" where abused women, victims of physical or moral acts of violence or following domestic or marital disagreements, can find temporary refuge.

Monique Mercier's silk screen processed prints are 22" x 26" in size (approximately 55 x centimeters) and sell for 400,00 \$ a piece. The Foundation issues an official receipt in the amount of 275,00 \$ which may be used for income tax deduction purposes. This is an once in a lifetime opportunity to become the owner of a valuable work of art while providing financial support to a worthwile charitable undertaking entirely devoted to the welfare of women and children in distress.

Monique Mercier was among the special guests in attendance at the Mercier gathering in 1987. She donated over thirty prints which were drawn for and distributed as prizes on that memorable occasion.

# Special award to Rev. Jean Mercier

The Order of French Fidelity in America has been attributed this year to Rev. Jean Mercier, a history professor in Sherbrooke, Quebec. The announcment was made early in May by the Council for the Survival of French in America.

Rev. Jean Mercier who is the founder of the Quebec Committee on Toponimy and the Committee for the Restoration of French in the Eastern Townships, is the only Quebec resident among this year's recipients of this decoration. It is awarded annually to five North Americans including four Canadians and one American.


The official presentation was

made by the Chancellor of the Order, Mr. Raymond J. Marcotte of Ottawa, at the annual banquet of the Sherbrooke Société St-Jean Baptiste.

The order was institued in 1947 by the Council for the Survival of French in America as a means of recognizing outstanding contribution on the part of Canadian and American citizens to the promotion of French culture in Canada and the United States.
