

It is not only the members of the board of directors who join with me, but also all the Mercier families to express their condolences and gratitude today.


In the past, when Ernest was the object of some honour, he always insisted on his right to a reply. This will be more difficult to-day, but I am sure that he will forgive us.

The parents of Ernest, Georges Mercier eandWilliamine Dion, were married in Saint-Damien-de-Bellechasse on the 26th of August 1895.

His father was one of 13 children, of which 10 sons survived. They were known to be very good lumbermen in their village.

Even if he could not write nor read, he occupied various positions such as churchwarden, school commissioner, and municipal assessor.

His mother, Williamine Dion, was a school teacher at one time, but she devoted most of her life to helping on the farm; she even tailored work clothes and fabricated footwear.

She had a higher degree of education for their time, and this made it possible for her to generate income from various sources. She directed that income towards the education of one of the sons and the two younger daughters.

GRATITUDE of Jean Pelletier

The funeral of Mr. ErnesChurch of Saint Martyrs, Canadians 9 March 2002

The Pelletier family has always felt privileged to have the Mercier clan as neighbors for the last 38 years. We are gathered here today to pay our respects to a remarkable man, the patriarch of the clan.

Even though a city dweller for dozens of years, he held on to his country attitudes. He was the twelfth of seventeen children, born and brought up in Notre-Dame-du-Rosaire in Montmagny County. In his early years he was involved in the cultivation and forestation of his fathers' land. He had pleasant memories of his youth and of his family life where spiritual and moral values were of prime importance. At an early age Mr. Mercier obtained a sense of duty, respect and help for those in need. This was the code by which he lived his life.

He could also be obstinate, as he himself would admit. He left high school by necessity and refused to be a tutor which was the only way which he would financially be able to continue his education. He worked on his father's farm for five years, but having a solid academic base never left his mind. In 1933 he returned to school for a higher education. He pursued courses in agriculture to the master's and doctoral level in science. Not bad for one who left high school then returned. After all of that, he had earned the right to preach to his children and grandchildren the need for higher formal education.

Mr. Mercier had a remarkable professional carreer in the agricultural field to which few have achieved. He was Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Quebec as well as the Canadian consultant in agricultural affairs for the United Nations for many years. The agricultural world in particular owes him much gratitude because he was associated with many important positive changes. He was credited with many agricultural programs. Consolidating farm cooperatives and fish coopera-

tives and the creation of a Canadian milk commission to name a few. He also reorganized a teaching cooperative for French speaking farmers in Quebec and worked for the privatization of a milk producers' association, etc.etc.

Therefore, it is not surprising that he has received so many Canadian and Quebec distinctions. For example, « Commander of the Order of Merit in Agriculture in Quebec», member of the « Agricultural Hall of Fame of Canada », officer of « The Order of Canada », to name a few.

Mr. Mercier exuded enthusiasm, energy and determination and he interested himself in all kinds of things. His fight against cancer and his involvement in the nursing home cooperative of Cap Diamant are admirable. His generous assistance for many years to his church and its works have not gone unnoticed as well as his contribution to the Association of Mercier Families of America (AMAN).

The memories we have of this remarkable man will not soon be forgotten. His faith, fidelity and loyalty to Quebec and Canada, his profound sense of family, the love he reserved for his children and grandchildren, his social preoccupation and help to others, all of these attributes have left a profound impression upon us all. His fierce determination, his frankness, his mix of trust and distrust, his capacity for anger and humour, all of this reminds us daily of the splendid country man he fundamentally remained. This solid Oak of a man, only death could knock down.

To Marcelle, his wife, his children and his grandchildren, our emotional condolences and a final affectionate and respectful salute to Ernest Mercier, this unique man whom we all loved dearly.

A TRIBUTE TO ERNEST

Ernest a Friend and a Leader

ast March 4th, at the age of eighty-eight, we all lost a respected friend and leader in Ernest Mercier. He made us all the beneficiary of his friendship and thoughtfulness. This friendship was demonstrated in different ways from his firm handshake upon his greetings and upon his goodbyes. Whether in public or at his home in the company of his wife Marcelle, his welcome was always warm and personal. Often have members of the ASSO-CIATION of MERCIERS of NORTH AMERICA which he founded have had the pleasure of discussing with him their personal interests.

Those who were closest to him can recall with pleasure their trips with him to assist in the preparation for a meeting of the administration or for a reunion or other AMAN activity. It was a pleasure to exchange ideas with him and to benefit from his advice and experience.

For us, members of AMAN, Ernest was a leader. Not only as founder of our family association in 1985 but as its founding president. He was the soul of the association's bulletin *Le Mercien* and an important part of the administration's governing body from its founding until his departure.

His activities as a leader manifested itself by his intense genealogy research particularly on the Mercier family and by his publication in 1987 of his book entitled *Mercier depuis des siècles* which contains approximately 400 pages of his research. His professional career is another proof that Ernest was an exceptional person. For about twelve years he was an advisor and consultant to various organizations in Quebec as well as national and international. For six years he was Deputy Minister of the ministry of Agriculture of Quebec, and for ten years in management of agricultural research and experimentation at a federal level. For three years he was the manager for the department of artificial insemination of cattle in the province of Quebec. Also during the depression years of 1929-1933 he spent three years in the study of efficient operation and production of family farms.

This remarkable man has received many decorations and honors. Among which were, Officer of the Order of Canada in 1989, member of the Pantheon of Agriculture of Canada in 1991, and in 1992 he was made a member of the Quebec Agricultural Hall of Fame. Several other medals and distinctions were bestowed upon him for exceptional service. He was also a life member of several canadian organizations.

In closing, those of us whom Ernest graced with his friendship should feel privileged and be grateful to him for having made things better in many areas.



From 1920 to 1925, Ernest attended grade school in the « Rang du Sud », and continued until January 1929, when, at the age of 15, he decided to quit school and took a paying job as a gravel hauler for the local town.

For a brief period, he worked as a lumberjack, in the footsteps of his uncles who had established their reputations. However, he was not fit for the job. The economic crisis of 1930, the drop in prices, wages and employment forced him to reconsider his future. In 1933, he entered college toward a Bachelor of Arts degree.

He completed the program in various colleges and entered Laval University's faculty of agriculture. Post-graduate studies at Cornell University led him to Master's and Ph.D degrees in 1946. The rest is history.

Ernest has always been proud of his children, with good reason. They all have a university education and are involved to day in areas such as engineering, actuarial work, communications, commerce and teaching.

He must have remembered having left school for a time at an early age and he probably wanted to avoid having his children face the same dilemna. He surely had enough experience to discuss the matter with them and guide them properly.

TRIBUTE TO OUR FOUNDER ERNEST MERCIER

Prnest Mercier has left us. He died on march 4th after a brief illness. He has left us in body but his spirit will always be with us. Through his writings and certainly by our memories of him, he will be with us for a very long time.

I was first acquainted with Ernest in the spring of 1985 when a short announcement appeared in a Quebec City newspaper. He was inviting any Mercier to join him in forming a Mercier Association and soliciting help for various tasks such as recruitment new members, and other tasks. Also on his agenda was the preparations for a large Mercier reunion which was to take place in 1987. At the time I felt that joining the association would allow me to learn more about my genealogy and more history about my ancestors.

This is how I came to know Ernest.

It is how I began to understand his qualities, his tireless work habits. He considered himself an organizer/researcher. No doubt that it was these qualities which lead to his success in so many research projects in the areas of agriculture and good nutrition. He often told me that finding new Mercier ties kindled a persons' interest in genealogy and the history of ones ancestors and added that he was not a good example because he had not begun his own research until the age of

65. We can't help but wonder if this may be the reason he was so relentless in his pursuit of good data, questioning his own assumptions and his own work.

He has told us he would continue to be part of the administration of AMAN if we could find no one to replace him. In reality I believe he wished to keep his post as administrator because AMAN always occupied his mind and helped him to stay alert.

After reading his biography one would think that with all his diplomas, his record of professional service, his discoveries in the areas of agriculture and nutrition, the many honors for exceptional service, and medals received that after his retirement he would have preferred to rest on his laurels and to lead a totally different life style. He preferred instead to make use of his experience, his research and cataloging of data and his general knowledge, particularly of Mercier families. Thus he has greatly demonstrated his humility.


His genealogy research has brought together Merciers from several branches. Let us hope that all his good work has not been in vain.

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We have inherited from Ernest the results of his reserach published in 1987 entitled Mercier depuis des siècles. This 500 pages book is a major contribution to the patrimony of the Merciers of North America. It contains a brief history of the first Merciers having settled in Quebec, their origin in France, the source of their patronym, as well as the history of several living families. This book can be obtained through the Association for \$40., plus mailing and handling. Although the book is in French, it is possible to obtain an English translation of the first five chapters from the translator himself.

This work has undoubtly inspired other Merciers to publish their family histories, such as Lucienne Mercier-Croteau in 1997, Pierre-Paul Mercier in 1999 and Jean-Marc Mercier in 2000.
