

arie, daughter of Léonidas Mercier and Rosalie Talbot was born August 24, 1911 in Manchester. She is the third of a family of 12 children. In 1914 his father Léonidas returned to live in Quebec, in St-Isidore d'Auckland. The return of the family is due to her big sister Lucienne who was wounded.

Léonidas found a job as a laborer for construction from the church and the rectory of St. Isidore.

Marie grew up in St-Isidore, went to grade school, she was confirmed there.

She went to live in community with the Daughters of Charity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in Sherbrooke on 30-08-1929.

éonidas married Rosalie Talbot in 20-01-1908 in Manchester.



250th anniversary of marriage of the ancestral couple Charles Mercier dit Lajoie and Marianne Lahaise

he military Charles Mercier Lajoie arrived in New France in 1757 with the regiment of Berry to participate in the in the Conquest. Grenadier in the French army, he was part of an elite squad who took part in several battles including those of Fort Carillonand Sainte-Foy.

The French army retreated to Montreal, they must surrender to the overwhelming superiority of the English army. This ends the military career of the ancestor Charles Mercier dit Lajoie. The conquerors gave the choice to the soldiers of the French army to repatriate to their country of origin or settle in the St. Lawrence valley. They are given religious freedom and immunity of property. Charles, like other soldiers of his regiment, saw, between battles, Canadian homestay. It is located in the area of Terrebonne near Montreal. Charles may have remained in the family of the widow Lahaise to the Assumption. He probably noticed the young Marianne Lahaise he chose to stay in Canada.

On June 22, 1761, when he was 25 years old, Charles wife Marianne age 14. It is the only son of Vincent and Catherine Mercier Gansard or Gaussard Beaumont Bramble in the ancient province of Touraine in Tours kilomères 20 (1). Marianne is the daughter of

Jean-Baptiste Lahaise and Marie-Anne Archambault. They settled on land located on the peninsula of the seigniory of Terrebonne in the current municipality of Legardeur. Their union were born three girls and nine boys, three of them died in infancy. Six boys into marriage as their three sisters. They perform the jobs of a farmer, carpenter, miller and traveler. The majority of the couple's children live in the area of Repentigny and Saint -Roch-de-l'Achigan.

Notarial deeds reveal that Charles is probably illiterate and it has properties that will sell or will sell to his son Jean-Louis and Francis. In the nineteenth century, two descendants of the couple are illustrated: Francis Xavier as an explorer in the Yukon and Alaska (The Mercian, volume 12, number 3) and Louis as co-founder of the regiment which became the Dorchester Regiment de la Chaudière (The Mercian, Volume 23, Number 4). The

two men share a common characteristic, their tall, 90 more than a meter (6 feet 4 inches). Presumably, their ancestor Charles was also a big man since the grenadiers were placed in the front line to impress the enemy.

Died at the age of 82, Charles Mercier said Lajoie was buried in Repentigny 19 September 1817 as his wife Marianne was in the same place at the age of 78 years January 28, 1825.

Their descendants make up about 5% of American Mercier. They are found mostly in the Lanaudière, the top of Bellechasse, Montreal, Ouebec and the United States.

(1) In a well documented research, John P. DuLong contests, with notarized documents as evidence, the birthplace of Charles. He said he was born in Removille in the diocese of Tour in Lorraine and not in the diocese of Tour in Touraine.

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Moderation and excess in Québec City

For a long time, everyone knows, Québec is a nest for great artists. Just think to our three tenors Raoul Jobin, Léopold Simoneau or Richard Verreau in the vocal art domain. But way before them, were names, forgotten these days, who also had their moment of glory. One on them, even had a destiny worthy of a detective novel.



François-Xavier Mercier, Murdered Tenor?

His name was François-Xavier Mercier, he had a wonderful tenor voice and had astonishing international career. He died in 1932. He was buried under a humble tomb stone in Cimetière Saint-Charles, where he brought with himself the secret of his death, suspect or strange we might say. But, let's not anticipate...

Mercier is born in Québec in August 1867 in the Faubourg Saint-Roch. His father, also named François-Xavier, is, as show the baptismal act, furniture maker. Very young, Mercier sings in the Notre-Dame de Jacques-Cartier's church and at the same time is studying at the Académie commercial: "Never I miss a occasion to make myself hear from other, in funeral, during a mass, a funeral or a wedding", that he will say in is memoirs called in Souvenirs de ma mémoire artistique in 1923. He will find a job has a fur tailor at the Compagnie Paquet, then he leave Québec for Toronto where he has is first professional success in concerts. Around 1894, he obtain the role at the opera, the Duc in Rigoletto at the Cattle Sqare Theater in Boston. All the repertory of the company is given in English and Mercier, hired at the last minute does not feel comfortable for the premiere. He sing the two first act in English. But the third is in Italian, at the surprise of the direction and the other artists who weren't prepared. The surprise become a huge success for the Italian public in the second balcony who claimed their enthusiasm for the young tenor.

At the height of greatness


In 1898, Mercier goes to Paris to study alongside Jacques Bouhy, famous Belgian baritone. Tyrannical master sometime, Bouhy believe in the protential of the young Quebecer and he open him the doors of his career. Thanks to him, soon as 1899, Mercier is at the Opéra-Comique and soon, he is applause elsewhere in France, and then Great-Britain, in Holland, Belgium and Algeria. He is a real superstar: He plays the first role of Guillaume Tell, the Huguenots, l'Africaine, la Juive, Romeo and Juliet, Faust, Carmen, Verther, Paillasse, Manon, Aida, Lehengrin and many more. His partners are the fabulous Emma Calvé, Nellie Melba, Antonio Scotti or Francesco Tamagno, the creator of Otello of Verdi. Everywhere, Mercier is attracting praise and arouses the enthusiastic.

He stays a part of the year 1907 in Québec City, following the death of his mother. He does a few concert, specially one on April 25 at the Autidorium (Now the Capitole). The crowd hurry up to the theatre but 500 peoples will be refuse. The direction of the theatre decide then to snatch the front doors to give a chance to hear the great artist by the most people on the street. Then, Mercier goes to Europe in The Empress of Ireland... Yes, the boat who will tragically sink near Rimouski in May 1914 - He meet the future Prime Minister of Québec, Alexandre Tachereau...

During the production of the Huguenots of Meyerbeer at Constantine, in Algeria, Mercier is stun by the soprano who plays the queen



Marguerite de Valois, a young woman of 22 years old from Lyon, Isabelle de Besson, who already work under the scene name of Isa Jeynevald. Already at 41 years of age, Mercier ask her to marry him. The wedding is celebrate in Lyon on July 21, 1909. On



August 15, 1913, both of them goes to Québec City, where a year later, because of the World War I have to stay for good there.

New Career

In 1916, the couple found the Institut d'art vocal, on St-Vallier street. At the same time, Mercier realize a few recording with the Columbia company, certains of these recordings are made in duo with is wife. She still possess her wonderful voice. If she still possess her voice, it is not the same for her husband, who at the age of 49, as lost a part of his talents. The recordings may not put him at his best or at least to reality. You can hear a few of the numerical collection of banq.qc.ca.

Mercier and his wife give a few concerts in the Québec City region, one of them at the Club Musical, but his great tenor career his behind him. His spend most of his time in composition: more than hundred musical pieces, mostly voice melodies for piano, some of them are signed in the partial anagram of G. de Revax. Skillful melodist, Mercier reveal in these pages a beautiful imagination. In France, in a poem of William Chapman, he subtly put the Marseillaise them in

The Institut d'art vocal form numerous students and create regularly small opera. On April 1923, a few scenes of the opera Jean-Marie d'Ulric Voyer are created. The school has success and will continue its vocation until the middle of the sixties, just before the death of Isa Jeynevald.

At the end of Autumn in 1932, a strange incident happen at the Merciers residence, on Conroy street. (Where is now the Marie-Guyart building): the singer is highly intoxicated by a gaz leak, his wife is barely troubled. He is in so bad shape that he has to be hospitalized. He is suddenly paralyzed. He fall from the stairs and broke an arm. He is send to the Saint-Sacrement hospital where he died on December 22, at age 65.

Miss Marple-Bélanger...

We could conclude to a dumb accident, maybe negligence and the case could be close... But an incriminating document, left in the fond F-X Mercier (P 576) at Archives nationales du Québec, in Québec City. Its a long hand written letter signed by Lucienne Bélanger, nurse and dated from February 22, 1977. This letter is simply called Testimony for Xavier Mercier, mighty Canadian tenor. Born in 1902, Lucienne Bélanger was the niece of the singer. Almost 55 years after the disappearance of Mercier, the lady wants to liberate her conscience and tell the truth about the death of her uncle.

In this testimony, Lucienne Bélanger will accuse her aunt, Isabelle, wife of the tenor, to have create a real machination. She portraits her aunt as a choleric young woman : like every celebrity, Mercier is being approach by everyone in the street, which irritate badly is wife. We cannot make ten steps. We also learned that at the arrival of the couple in Québec City, Isabelle had a lover, which is a cousin of Mercier (Miss Marple-Bélanger even give the name us the name of the cousin). He will not be the only one. She will have many more. She recruit her lovers among her students and among married men. Mercier knows that he is being cheated but say to his friend Jean-Marie Lachance: I swear on the altar to protect her, and I will protect her until my death.

In 1926, Mercier give a concert at Monument national in Montréal which gives him a little \$90. His wife order him to stop singing. Sadly, Mercier stop his professional concert. He has left many things because of her, including position. He lost dollars to win cents...

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It is only at the death of Isabelle that one of the Mercier's sister, Marie-Laure Bruneau, will sign a document in which the story will be reveal. Lucienne Bélanger, her niece, will ask her why she has waited all this time. The old lady will say: I was too much scared of her, this woman was capable of anything. Isa Jeynevald was scaring the whole family of her husband report the nurse Bélanger. She tells that during the hospitalization of Mercier he was talking with his sister Florentine when she arrived like a raging lion, creating a complete terror climate around her.

Sleeping with gas...

For already a while, the Mercier couple were not sleeping together. He was upstair and she was at the first floor level. After the return of Mercier from the hospital, Lucienne Bélanger as a nurse go four days at her uncle's house to take care of him. Every night, while going to the toilet, she notice that the gas stove is lightly open under the coffee pot but no flame under. He was sleeping upstairs and her, downstairs. The carbon monoxide was accumulating in the stairs. Just after the death of her husband she got rid of the gaz line, saying that she would no longer use it. This is a thinly veiled accusation. Is a would have voluntarily open the gas, knowing that it would poison her husband but not her. The young widow will pursuit the Quebec Power company. At the trial, they did not mentioned the name of her lovers, and to count them would have take too long. The role of Isabelle in her husband death never was in question, the only the responsibility of the Quebec Power. Isabelle will not win her claim. Everything is forgotten rapidly.

Life continue. Isa Jeynavald, will never be bothered by justice (and nothing prove that she has done something against her husband), she continue teaching at Institut d'art vocal. She will have many singers who will have beautiful career, among them Adrienne Roy-Vilandré, the baritone

Gilles Lamontagne, the low voice Roland Gosselin and even Robert L'Herbier, who after being a popular singer, will be director of the Télé-Métropole programming.

Isabelle de Besson-Jeynevald-Mercier died in solitude and poverty in Québec City on April 7, 1967. She return to side of her husband at Saint-Charles cemetery. (She will be buried at the expense of Canadians that she despised). They are now united in eternity.

Epilogue: a duty to remember

The testimony of Lucienne Bélanger ends on troubling words. It is not her country that has forgotten her, neither those who have known her but an alien in the country, who has destroy her career, buried her and her memory at the same time. There was nothing to do while she was alive. After all these years, it would be time that the Canadians wake up. Let's not wait before all his friends are deaths. I implore those who read these lines to do something.






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
