

Lévis: Yesterday and today

The City of Lévis, officially founded in 1861, takes its roots from the first village on the South-Shore of Quebec City called Saint-Joseph-de-la-Pointe-de-Lévy, situated in the eastern section of the Seigneurie de Lauzon

Louis Carrier (1816-1874) became the first Mayor of Lévis in 1861. Afterwards, he was reelected by acclamation every two years until 1870, the year when he definitely left politics. Louis and his brother Antoine were owners of a store at the corner



of Saint-Georges and Saint-Antoine.

François Gaston de Lévis (1719-1787).


In 1748, King Louis XV makes him a Chevalier of Saint-Louis. He is then known under the name of Chevalier of Lévis.

In April 1756, he is named Brigadier and Commander-in-second of the French Army of Canada.It is in vain that he wins the battle of Ste-Foy in 1760. In 1783. he becomes Maréchal of France.



On June 19 2013, a monument is erected in his honour on the Terrasse-de-Lévis.

Guillaume Couture (1618-1701), an unknown hero of New-France, has his monument situated in Old-Lauzon. Carpenter Guillaume Couture is first and foremost a «coureur des bois». In 1645, he is the interpreter at the signing of the first Peace Treaty between the French and the Iroquois.

On May 15 1647, he is rewarded by the Governor of New-France who gives him a piece of land in the Seigneurie deLauzon where he is considered to be the first 'colon'. In 1663, he discovers Lake Mistassini.

In 1690, as Captain of the Militia, he pushes back the troops of Admiral William Phipps at Pointe-Lévy.

The **Alphonse-Desjardins House**, place of the first Credit-Union of North America is classified as a historical monument in 1983. The Desjardins Movement, started in 1900, carries the name of its founder. He marries Dorimène Roy-Desjardins on September 2 1879 in the church of Saint-Pierre-de-Sorel. The members who will participate in the annual assembly of the Association of the Mercier of North America which will be held on September 13 2014 will have the opportunity of visiting this historical residence decorated in a 1906 Victorian decor. With the help of photos, maps and testimonies, we discover how Alphonse and Dorimène succeeded in establishing their audacious project.

Napoléon Mercier founded in 1891 the Scies Mercier Inc. It is one of the oldest manufacturers of sawing equipment in North America. Initially installed in a building built in 1880, the company produces round saws, small saws, hand saws etc... Today, the Scies Mercier Inc. occupies a modern facility and fabricates tools for industrial saw-mills for wood, metals and the food industry.





The Société des traversiers of Quebec (ferry services) has revealed the architectural plans for the **future fluvial station of Lévis.** This modern two-story structure made of glass and wood will be built at the end of the mobile ferry foot-bridge. Each year, more than two million passengers use the ferry.


The new station will have a first floor, a hall of entry, administrative offices for the Quebec-Lévis Ferry services, a ticket counter and a restaurant.



The Manège Militaire (Armoury) of Lévis



The Manège Militaire de Lévis built in 1911 is a building of romane architectural inspiration. It is the home of the Régiment de la Chaudière Museum. This museum is consecrated to the memory of one of the most ancient Canadian military units. The Régiment de la Chaudière distinguished itself on the European Front in 1944-1945 by being the only French-Canadian Unit to be present during the troop landings in Normandy on June 6 1944. Those who will participate in the general assembly of the Association of the Mercier of North America will be fortunate to visit an exposition on the beach landing in Normandy and to hear and see video recordings of veterans who participated in that landing some 70 years ago.



Captain **Louis Mercier** dit Lajoie (1847-1907) of Sainte-Justine, previously the County of Dorchester, today the County of Bellechasse, is considered as one of the founders of the 92nd Regiment of Dorchester and Beauce which would become in the 1930s the Régiment de la Chaudière. It appears that he attended a military school in Quebec. Having obtained his grades, he formed a company of militia in Sainte-Justine. At the entry to the museum of the Régiment de la Chaudière, one can see a mosaic where figure the pictures of all the founders of the Régiment of Dorchester and Beauce.

A View of Lévis from the City of Quebec



The Old-Lévis, as seen above, proudly faces the city of Quebec separated only by the Saint Lawrence River. The city of Lévis has a present population of over 140 000 inhabitants. It is under the leadership of the parish priest Joseph-David Déziel that the city took the name of Lévis. His statue is erected in front of the church of






On November 20 1851, the Vicar General Charles-Félix Cazeau blessed the new church and the very same day, parish priest Joseph-David Déziel celebrated the first mass. This church is the biggest of its time on American soil after that of Notre-Dame-de-Montreal. The proclamation was signed on September 28 1852 by Lord Elgin, Governor General of Canada.

This church is classified as a historical monument since 2003. Its neo-classical architecture, its rich interior decoration and its Mitchell Grand Organ make it very appealing to the visitors.

The **Terrasse de Lévis**, inaugurated in 1939 by King George VI and Queen Elizabeth (mother of Queen Elizabeth II) offers a panoramic view of the ramparts of Quebec City, Chateau Frontenac, the Quebec and Pierre-Laporte Bridges, the Laurentian Mountains up to Mont Sainte-Anne and Île d'Orléans.



The Old-Lévis Train Station built in 1864 served in the course of time as a terminal for the Grand-Trunk, the Intercolonial and the Quebec Central Railways. It is then recognized as an important link between the Maritimes and Western Canada. The City of Lévis is serviced by the railways before the City of Quebec. The train station is renovated and modernised in 1986 to accommodate the passenger services of VIA Rail. The building's railway vocation ends on October 24 1998 when the last train 'Océan' leaves the station of Lévis. It is then that important work is



done to take away all railway equipment and rails from the whole railroad system, paving the way to develop a bicycle trail, the 'Parcours des Anses' which rapidly becomes the most frequented recreational area of the region. This development brought a new vocation to the old railway station. Since, the building becomes a center that serves as the terminal for the Quebec-Lévis ferry, the Lévis Tourist Bureau and the Bicycle Renting agency.

Industries in Lévis



The Jean-Gaulin Refinery (Ultramar) of Lévis

The Jean-Gaulin Refinery of Lévis, open in 1971, processes foreign crude oil from over-seas carried by tankers to its deepwater port on the Saint Lawrence River. The 500 employees of the most important refinery of Eastern Canada contribute to

the production of 265 000 barrels a day (41.5 million litres). With a storage capacity of 8.7 million barrels of crude oil, intermediate and refined products, the refinery can also store liquefied petroleum gas. If the Enbridge Oil Company project is realised, the oil arriving from the West Canadian oil sands would secure the actual jobs and create more than one hundred new posts.



The Maritime Shipyard of Lévis

Chantier Davie Canada Inc. is the biggest maritime shipyard in Canada. It was founded in 1829 by Captain Allison Davie. From one generation to the next, the workers have succeeded in an effective transition from sail ships to steamships, from wooden ships to steel ships, adopting new technologies to satisfy new needs.



force could increase to 1200 employees in 2014.

In 1916 and 1917, the shipyard participates in the towing and the installation of the central truss of the Pont de Québec. During the Second World War, the company contributes to the construction and the maintenance of corvettes (little warships) used to patrol and accompany convoys on the Saint Lawrence River and on the Atlantic Ocean.

Later on, the shipyard meets with some success but also faces some critical periods. At a certain time, there is even fear for its survival. Today, the shipyard is booming with activity occupying some 750 workers. With the construction of two boats for the Société des traversiers du Québec, it is anticipated that the work-

Where Has Gone the «Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier»?

How can the Municipality of Saint-Roch-del'Achigan so easily sweep away 150 years of history?

In 2007, the administrators of the Municipality of Saint-Roch-de-l'Achigan wanted to eliminate the name of «Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier» and replace it by the Armand-Majeau Road, but the protest organised by the descendants of the Mercier interrupted the procedure. Ironically, seven years later, after the November elections, signs indicate new road nameswithout the authorisation of the Commission de Toponymie du Québec.

Agnès Mercier Henri and her brother Michel take up the battle of 2007 and form a committee for the preservation of the «Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier» with the help of Lise Gauthier and Lise St-André. To date, a petition has been signed by more than 1400 citizens who approve «maintaining as is» the name of a road more than centenary.

Why should the administrators of the Municipality of Saint-Roch-de-l'Achiganbe so cold hearted and sweep away an historical name that exists for more than 150 years while they showed themselves to be sensitive to the preservation of our heritage during the procedures for the transformation of the old convent of Saint-Roch, which became the Municipal Offices?

The Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier was named in honor of Joseph Mercier ditLajoie (1813-1884). It is more than a simple line in the Achigan landscape. It is the continuation and the tradition left by first class public servants, Joseph being a school commissioner and a mayor, which gives honor to the builders of

yesterday. It is a road which serves as a memory lane and symbolizes equally the achievements of the pioneers of the Mercier family in Saint-Roch-de-l'Achigan.

Request made to Mister Mayor Georges Locas and the municipal councillors of Saint-Roch-de-l'Achigan

Dear administrators of this beautiful municipality, we ask you to annul your decision of December last and follow the second recommendation made by the Commission de Toponymie du Québec which recognizes the great historical value of the name «Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier».

We quote an extract of the letter of March 4 2014 addressed to the General Director of the Municipality: the Commission de Toponymie du Québec proposes two possibilities to reduce the number of names which presently designate four roads that are in one continuous line and preserves the historical name.

- 1. Attribute the name Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier to the three roads actually designated under the names Marchand Road, Docteur-Wilfrid-LocatSud Road and Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier and maintain the odonyme Armand-Majeau Road in the industrial section.
- 2. Attribute the name Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier to the four roads actually designated under the names Marchand Road, Docteur-Wilfrid-LocatSud Road, Chemin-de-la-Ligne-Mercier and Armand-Majeau Road.



Finally, we wish to thank all the people who have supported us by signing the petition and we hope that the City Council will recognize the name **«Cheminde-la-Ligne-Mercier»** accepted since 1864.

Blanche Mercier-Lussier was the great aunt of Laurent who is on the Board of Directors.




Joseph-Émile Mercier has left us
