





## THE ANCESTRAL COUPLE JEAN MERCIER AND FRANÇOISE RADEGONDE DE MAYEUSE

The Merciers living in the United States represent 40% of all of the Merciers in North America. The majority of these Merciers are descendants of French Canadians who emigrated to New England in the second half of the 19th century and at the start of the 20th. At the time of colonization, a few Merciers emigrated from France directly to the United States. Among them was Jean Mercier, born on May 25, 1734 in Saint-André-de-Cubzac, a village located some fifteen kilometres north of the city of Bordeaux, in southwestern France.



Jean was the son of Jean-Baptiste Mercier and Marie Apperd. At the age of 31, in 1765, he settled in New Orleans, Louisiana, where he became a successful merchant. At the time of his arrival, Louisiana had been a Spanish colony for three years. The population was then estimated to be around 20,000 residents. Jean married Françoise Radegonde de Mayeuse in 1773. They had three children: Juana Louisa Justina, Maria Gratiana and Jean-Baptiste. It is believed that Jean had earlier been married to Thérèse Lagarde in France. Eighteen years later (in 1791), he married Marie Gracieuse de Fontenelle, daughter of a grand Creole family who owned plantations on the left bank of the Mississippi.





The Commagere-Mercier House, located at 630 Saint Peter Street in the old French Quarter, was built in 1796 by Pedro Commagere. It was sold in 1806 to Madame Gracieuse Fontenelle, wife of Jean-Baptiste Mercier.

On a plaque on the Commagere-Mercier House, located at 630 Saint Peter Street in the old French Quarter of New Orleans, one can read the names of the couple, who owned it in the early 1800s. They had two daughters, Justine and Marie Amélie, who together requested the emancipation of a female mulatto slave named Roseline in their mother's estate, in 1824. They vouch that Roseline is above the age of thirty and that she is a slave of "good moral". In a document at the Digital Library on American Slavery, they are identified as the heirs of Marie Gracieuse de Fontenelle Mercier. One can deduce from this that like other plantation owners, Jean and his wife had slaves in their service. Jean died at the age of 84 and was interred on April 18, 1818 in New Orleans.

Jean-Baptiste, the only son of Jean, perpetuated that Mercier line. He married Héloïse, daughter of Pierre Leduc and Joséphine Lecourt, who had come from Canada after the Treaty of Paris in 1763. They had six children: Jean-Jacques, Marie-Clarisse (Adèle), Charles-Édouard, Henriette-Amandine, Placide-Jules-Armand and Charles-Alfred. It was an affluent family. They could afford to vacation in France.



Alfred and Armand studied in Paris and became physicians. The daughters found well-to-do husbands: Henriette-Amandine married Pierre Soulé, a lawyer and future Senator in Washington, while Marie-Clarisse (Adèle) married Louis T. Caire, a notary.

# The Old Square, or French Quarter, New Orleans, Louisiana.

Alfred (1816-1894) even though a doctor, was known mainly as a poet, novelist and playwright. He is recognized as a distinguished Mercier by the *Association des Mercier d'Amérique du Nord*. In his writings, he gave a different version of his origins. He said he was the grandson of a man named Jean, who was born in 1772 near Bordeaux, France, who arrived in New Orleans in 1793 fleeing the French Revolution and that Jean had earlier married Françoise Radegonde de Mayeuse in France. The year of his arrival in New Orleans, Jean obtained an immense land concession of several thousand acres. He made no mention of the Fontenelle family. The story seems to be closer to a novel than to reality. A dispute over the estate may explain the rewriting of his ancestors' history.



The Jean Mercier and Marie Gracieuse de Fontenelle Couple lived in New Orleans, near the Saint Louis Cathedral, in the heart of the French Quarter.

When Alfred's father passed away, the estate was quite complex. Jean-Baptiste's descendants, whose mother was Françoise Radegonde de Mayeuse, launched a series of lawsuits against the descendants of Marie Gracieuse de Fontenelle and various New Orleans banks. The Louisiana Supreme Court decided in favour of Alfred's cousins and the banks, which resulted in depriving Alfred and his siblings of a huge property. The plantation produced an annual income of \$150,000 in 1830. Family reconciliation was never achieved.

During the Civil War, Alfred tried in vain to persuade the French to support the Confederates. After the war, he returned to a devastated Louisiana. Jean-Baptiste's family lost a lot during the conflict. He practised medicine while fighting to preserve the French language, which seemed to him to be on the decline. France made him an **Officier de la Légion d'honneur** in order to thank him for his support of the French language.

The descendants of Jean Mercier were renowned in the fields of medicine, letters and business. They probably represent a very small percentage of the American Merciers. They live mostly in the southern and the western United States.



Louisiana became a State of the United States in 1803. New Orleans had a population of 8,475 in 1805. From 1806 to December 1809, the city's population more than doubled with the arrival of a total of 9159 French refugees from Saint Domingue, of whom 2731 were Whites, 3102 were free Blacks and 3326 were slaves. In 1810, the city's population was 24552, of whom only 3200 were Anglophones. (View of New Orleans in 1803).


Lise is presently completing the digitizing of our Le Mercien, our main source of information since 1985.

At the same time, our archivist Gilmond, our tireless historian and researcher, has scrutinized all our other documents page by page: minutes of proceedings, communiqués, correspondence, financial statements, pictures and texts of all kinds, which used to be stored at our warehouse in Wendake, near Quebec City, but which we have emptied at the end of 2016.

This article, with pictures, is to show you the "major clean-up" done by our people in order to preserve "the memory" of the association.



Three storage cabinets had been filling up with documents, year after year, at the warehouse, including multiple copies of the same documents. Our predecessors did not want "anything to get lost" and rightly so, thinking that abundance was not a bad thing. The members of the Board brought the whole accumulation down to what amounts to one storage cabinet. We could eventually digitize all of the documents so that they can fit on a single USB key. Whether we like it or not, technology is catching up with us all and even quickly outpaces us. We must use it in order to energize our association.

The numerous discoveries made by Gilmond while reading our archives will allow us to state that our founding families were all covered in our various Le Mercien newsletters. One fact is rather surprising: articles about Julien, the most prolific of our ancestors, are among the least "voluminous" of our presentations.

The 2015 publication of our "Répertoire généalogique des MERCIER de l'Amérique du Nord" represented a full update of our research about our six founding families. In our upcoming Le Mercien issues, we will publish the latest revisions about our ancestors.
