

ANDRÉ MERCIER 1929-2021

André was a great volunteer for the Association des Mercier de l'Amérique du Nord for 25 years, from 1986 to 2011. He was born in Montmagny, he married Lucille Létourneau and he was the father of two children - François and Louis, and grandfather of Frédérick and Félix. Our condolences go out to the family.

During his working life, he engaged in both communications and administration, and he was a member of the staff of the Quebec National Assembly, in the Office of the Secretary General.

He was a member of the Board of Directors of the Association des Mercier for 10 years, from 1986 to 1995 and President for 3 years, from 1989 to 1992. He also chaired the organizing committee for the 1987 gathering, where 1300 members met in Sainte-Anne-de-Beaupré and he coordinated the international gathering of 1997 in Beaupré and in Quebec City. André was also the archivist of the association from 1988 to 2011.



FRANÇOIS MERCIER A RENOWNED MAN OF THE LAW

This is the fourth and last article on Hélène Mercier and her family predecessors.

It is about her father François Mercier.



François Mercier 1923 - 2010

After achieving excellent grades at Collège Loyola, François chose to attend law school at *Université de Montréal*, ending a family tradition of studying medicine, as his father and his grandfather had been eminent surgeons (see Le Mercien, volume 36 No. 3 and volume 36 No. 4). Admitted to the bar at the age of 22, he followed that with a spectacular career pleading before all the courts in Canada.

Recognized by his peers as "one of the greatest litigants in recent history", he was chosen to defend several 'causes célèbres': in the James Bay Case, he represented Premier Robert Bourassa; in the Olympic Stadium construction case, he represented architect Tallibert; he also worked on the investigation of a DC-8 Air Canada plane crash in Sainte-Thérèse.... He was an Associate

with Stikeman, Elliott, Tamaki, Mercier and Turner, one of the most prestigious law firms in Canada, with his career being marked by a string of honours and decorations. He was made Queen's Counsel in 1961, Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers in 1975 and Officer of the Order of Canada in 1976.

Even with a very busy career, he found time to volunteer for various cultural and social organizations and he also chaired several boards of directors. He was the guest of honour at the 1992 annual general meeting of the *Association des Mercier de l'Amérique du Nord* in Montreal, marking the 350th anniversary of the founding of the city.

François was the son of Jeanne Bruneau and Oscar Mercier, from the line of the Merciers also known as Lajoie. He was born in Paris, April 13, 1923, when his father was in medical school. He married Lucile Rouleau in Montreal and they are the parents of Geneviève, Madeleine, Jean-François and Hélène. He passed away on February 4, 2010.

JEAN MAHEUX QUEBEC ACTOR AND SINGER

Let me introduce to you actor Jean Maheux, who played for six seasons the character of Honoré Mercier in the television series "Les Pays d'en haut". Born in Saint-Georges-de-Beauce, the actor belongs to the Maheux-Caron families, who are well known in the Beauce region for their involvement in cultural, artistic and community organizations. His uncle, Yves Caron, was a federal liberal member of Parliament for Beauce from 1972 to 1979. Jean showed an interest for singing at a very early age. I had the pleasure of accompanying him when he was beginning with the vocal group L'Écho Beauceron in the 1970s. He remains the best nationally known actor from our region. His great versatility as an actor, a dancer and especially a singer makes him one of the best of his generation.

His interpretation of Honoré Mercier required special preparation. Maheux noted that last February in an interview for an article published in *l'Éclaireur-Progrès* in Saint-Georges, written by Beauce journalist Frédéric Desjardins: "Before filming the series, I learned all I could about Honoré Mercier. This Premier was the first one who wanted more autonomy for Quebec. He wanted to get some distance from the federal government and to prevent the emigration of Quebecers to the United States. We owe to him the development of the railway to outlying areas. The priest Antoine Labelle (played by Antoine Bertrand in the series) was his deputy minister".

Among memorable scenes Jean was in, he remembers particularly the election speech he made in Sainte-Adèle (Season one). Honoré Mercier found himself in the middle of a fight between liberal and conservative supporters. "One whole day was needed to film that scene. While my speech was filmed from different angles, actors and stuntmen were fighting in the mud. I had to jump down from the wagon and it was mighty high! There was a take where I put up my fists as if about to fight, but it was not kept in the end", he said with a laugh. The inauguration of the railway at the Sainte-Adèle station (Season 5) was also a highly emotional one for the Beauce actor. "The scene where I strip away from Séraphin his title of deputy minister (Season 6) was also quite intense", he recalled.

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One of his greatest roles, as was mentioned in various articles and interviews in the media, was undoubtedly the character of Don Quixote, from Spanish author Miguel de Cervantès, whose first version was published in 1605. Although the staging was the same as for the original one, it was the French adaptation by Jacques Brel in 1968 which was also done again. The original stage set had been saved so it could be reused. As for the cast, it was possible to use the same actors, 17 years later, except for Joëlle Bourdon, who took over for one part. In the end, eight actors resumed their parts, including Jean Maheux, the lead actor, who played again Don Quixote and Cervantès. "We gave more than 150 performances". He admitted that he had hesitated before agreeing to take on the role again, saying: "It was a very demanding role to play, but it was impossible to say no to such an adventure."



The popular series "Les Pays d'en haut", broadcast by Ici Radio-Canada, ended on Monday, February 8, 2021, after six seasons and 52 episodes: Jean Maheux, from Saint-Georges, played the role of Premier Honoré Mercier in this series.

If the pandemic situation allows, the play will return in 2021, at least we hope so, directed by René-Richard Cyr and it will once again be greatly appreciated. A lover of words and of the Middle Ages, Jean has been working for several years with the poems of François Villon. "The work slowdown gave me the opportunity to devote some time to writing. With Normand Forget and Francis Perron, oboe and piano respectively, I wrote a contemporary and Quebec piece linked with Brecht's Threepenny Opera and Villon's poems. I added my own songs and poems, so it is somewhat autobiographical".

Jean Maheux is a real Beauce man, hardworking, curious about the world around him and with a great love for his beautiful region. Thanks to his great simplicity and the discipline he puts into preparing to play various characters, it makes him an honoured representative of Quebec.

FRANÇOIS GENDRON: A CAREER FORGED BY HIS CHILDHOOD

François Gendron talks about his difficult youth which led him to spend 42 years as a Member of the National Assembly




François Gendron published his biography where he related his difficult childhood and his 42-year career as a Member of the National Assembly.

There were hardships when he was growing up on a small farm in the Abitibi region. François Gendron lost his father too soon. He had to work very hard to finish his schooling, and that left its mark on the man who holds the record for the longest time spent as a member of the Quebec National Assembly.

"My father was a farmer (the farm was not profitable, and so he had to work at a plant to supplement his income). When you have to milk the cows in the morning before walking to school, it builds one's character", said the former member of the Parti québécois during an interview.

In his biography, he talked about his roots, which have profoundly marked his long career in the National Assembly, his social-democratic convictions and his regionalist leanings.



François Gendron, son of Odilon Gendron and Marguerite Mercier, is the grandson of Édouard Mercier from the line of Paschal to Jullien. Born in Val-Paradis in Abitibi, he spent his childhood on his parents' farm. Following his studies to become a teacher, he started his career in teaching before entering provincial politics in 1976. He married Madeleine Gagnon and became the father to three children and grandfather to seven grandchildren.

From La Sarre to Beijing

In 2012, as vice-premier, he was officially welcomed in China. "I could hardly believe that a little guy from the sixth and seventh line road west of La Sarre, the son of a farmer, who lost his father when he was too young, had the chance to experience such a moment", he wrote.

Indeed, Mr. Gendron, who was a minister 11 times during his career, including for Education, did not have an easy life. His father, Odilon Gendron, went to settle in Abitibi, as part of the Vautrin agricultural colonization plan and "to avoid conscription in 1940". Upon their arrival, his mother, Marguerite Mercier, was "flabbergasted by the living conditions there".

His family lived the life of peasants, "without television or much money". "The flush toilet arrived in our home when I was 12. Prior to that, we had to go to the outhouse or use a bucket placed in the basement", he wrote.

Schooling the hard way

It is a euphemism to say that schooling left something to be desired. When he was done with elementary school, his parents wished to keep him at home so he could work on the farm.

A religious man, a cousin of his father, convinced the family to send him to a juvenate (a school for future seminarists). His aunt Isabelle agreed to help pay for his high school education in Berthierville, in the Lanaudière area.

One day, disaster struck! François Gendron's spiritual advisor came to the conclusion that the 17-year-old had not received the calling, and he expelled him from the college. When he came back from Berthierville to inform his parents, tragedy struck again. His father died in a car accident caused by a drunk driver.

He managed however to convince the religious authorities to take him back, but with certain conditions. He had to clean the washrooms and he was not allowed to take part in recess activities.



" Such an experience forged my character and taught me that one has to fight for one's convictions", wrote Mr. Gendron.

Paperboy at the age of 19

Until he obtained his teaching certificate, Mr. Gendron had to do all kinds of little odd jobs to survive. "I was a paperboy at the age of 19, and some people called me dumb", he said. At some point, he was sleeping in a church basement and his only way to keep clean was to wash with a facecloth.

When he was elected as a member for Abitibi-West in 1976, with the wave that brought to power René Lévesque's Parti Québécois, Mr. Gendron was a teacher and a union representative. Both these experiences helped him in his fight to get the Abitibi-Témiscamingue region its own university.

In the 1980s, he led a program for the reform of regional development. As the son of a farmer, he eventually brought forward a policy aimed at achieving food sovereignty, under the Marois government in 2012.

Anxiety

His health eventually suffered from his long political career. "I experienced panic attacks on a regular basis between 1983 and 1990", he wrote. Over a period of five years, he ended up about ten times at the emergency room. He managed in the end to get some control over his health thanks to the psychological counselling he received.

Today, Mr. Gendron, who lives in La Sarre, a few kilometres from the place where he was born, admits to "feeling sad watching the present situation the PQ is in". He does not feel he will live to see Quebec become independent, even though he is still a believer.



Mr. Gendron was honoured by a number of premiers for his political career.

At the age of 77, he continues to believe that some day Quebec will resume its march towards sovereignty. "I can give you a list of political attachés of members of the governing party (the CAQ) who still have the word sovereignty tattooed on their heart", he said with a laugh.

François Gendron, "42 ans de passion pour le Québec et ses régions" (42 years of passion for Quebec and its regions), was written in cooperation with Samuel Larochelle, and will be available as of May 5, at éditions Druide.

IN ILLINOIS (U.S.A.) BEFORE 1760 - PART 1

A study published by Rénald Lessard and his colleagues (2) cites as an example the case of several Mercier Pioneers who left Quebec to settle further in the South, in the territory of the Illinois. This territory was formerly a part of New France but, with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles in 1783, it became one part of the most important rural states in the U.S.A. Several facts and heroic deeds compiled and reported by the author of "Mercier depuis des siècles" (1987), supplement this rather fascinating anecdote.

Jean-Paul Mercier (1694 - 1753)

The first male Mercier from Quebec to establish residence in the land of the Illinois was the Reverend Jean-Paul Mercier. He was the son of the locksmith Louis Mercier and Anne Jacquereau and the grandson of the original pioneer couple Jullien Mercier and Marie Poulain, whose marriage was blessed in the home of Robert Giguier (Giguère) in Sainte-Anne-de-Beaupré on January 18th, 1654.

Born on the first of August 1694, Jean-Paul Mercier entered "Le Petit Séminaire de Québec" (secondary school for seminarists) on the 23rd of June, 1710 and was ordained to the priesthood by Mgr de Saint-Vallier (La Croix) in 1718, after eight years of preparation. Shortly after his ordination, Jean-Paul set out for the land of the Illinois. At the time, "Le Séminaire de Québec" was actively engaged since 1699 in the establishment and development of the Holy Family Mission in Cahokia (East St. Louis) the diminutive homeland of the American Indians "Tamarois", situated along the shores of the Cahokia Creek, a small tributary of the Mississippi River, some 15 miles down stream from the mouth of the Missouri River. The mission was, at that time, possibly the only mission developed and maintained by the Primatial Church of Québec south of the 45th parallel. After 35 years of dedication and hard work, Father Jean-Paul died and was buried in Cahokia on March 30th, 1753. He also ministered to the population of "Fort-de-Chartres" established in 1717.

Dorothée Mercier


The first Mercier woman, to establish residence in the land of the Illinois was Dorothée Mercier, a first cousin of Father Jean-Paul. This younger daughter of Jean Mercier and Barbe Monmainier (Montmeunier) was the grand daughter of the original pioneer couple Jullien Mercier and Marie Poulain. She was married on the 16th of May 1718 to Pierre Chabot, "lord" of Kaskaskia and former husband of Symphrose Tapakoe, deceased. The marriage contract was signed in the presence of Father Antoine Chabot, pastor of "Sainte-Anne-de-Beaupré", and committed to the care of Notary Verreau (Part of the latter's notes for the 13th of May 1718).

Kaskaskia was an Indian mission located south of Fort-de-Chartres and Prairie-du-Rocher, Illinois. It was ministered to by the Jesuits since its establishment by Marquette in 1675.

Jean-Baptiste Mercier

On May 11th 1718, the Reverend Antoine Chabot, pastor at Sainte-Anne-de-Beaupré - was he related to Pierre Chabot? - joined in holy matrimony Jean-Baptiste Mercier and Marie Baret (Barette). Jean is the brother of Dorothée. His wife was the daughter of Pierre Baret, an army lieutenant, and Marie Marguerite Bélanger (Bellenger), deceased.

Jean Mercier had previously been granted, on August 29th 1712, a lot of land within the parish of St. François-du-Sud (county of Montmagny) situated approximately 500 metres east of the actual church. The official declaration and enumeration of his holdings, registered by the "lord" of "Seigneurie de Berthier-Bellechasse", in 1724, reveals that this third generation couple, Jean Mercier and Marie Baret were not, at that time, farming their granted lot in the parish of "Saint-François-du-Sud".



Jean had in fact settled in the land of the Illinois several years earlier, at least some time prior to 1718. The couple had four children, all born and baptised in Kaskaskia. Two of their children died at an early age. Two sons, Jean Baptiste, born on July 18^{th,} 1719, and Jacques, born April 29, 1726 survived.

Jean-François Mercier (1699 - 1769)

Jean-François Mercier, a third generation Mercier from Québec, was the brother of Father Jean-Paul Mercier. He was born in Québec on the 23rd of March 1699. He first journeyed to the land of the Illinois in 1725 but shortly after, he returned to his native city of Québec and was married in Sainte-Foy to Catherine Lafontaine on February 17th, 1726. Some time between 1732 and 1735, after having sold his father's estate with his sister Marguerite Mercier-Loiseau, he returned to the land of the Illinois with his wife and children. He helped his brother, Father Jean-Paul, to consolidate the mission of the Diocese of Quebec in Cahokia.

In 1735, the Reverend Jean-Paul Mercier drew up himself, or had somebody else draw up, the plans of the Holy Family Mission. Jean-François Mercier was then farming his own lot in Illinois. The census of 1752 shows him as the only person bearing the title "Sieur". With the help of his wife, his three children and four black slaves, he was then cultivating some 70 arpents in the Seigniory of the Tamarois. Furthermore, he carried the title of travelling merchant, as shown in some official documents of that period. He died in 1769 or 1770 at Cahokia.
